Thermometer or Thermostat?

After studying John 5:1-18 for our adult VBS, I was struck by Jesus approaching the man who had been paralyzed for thirty-eight years. Jesus said to him, "Do you want to get well?" The man explained that he had no one to help him into the pool of Bethesda and by the time he got to the stirring water, someone would get in ahead of him. What struck me was that Jesus didn't even acknowledge the man's complaint or problem. Jesus simply told him, "Get up, pick up your mat and walk." The man instantly got up, picked up his mat and walked. The Word of God had the power to change what the paralyzed man was incapable of changing. Jesus told him to do something and as soon as the man trusted and obeyed, he found that everything changed.

That made me think of a message I heard at a Promise Keeper's rally decades ago. It was about the difference of being a thermometer versus a thermostat. A thermometer just reports the temperature of the environment. It doesn't do anything about it and can't do anything about it. Humans are good at being thermometers. In the summer months, many report (complain) about how hot it is and in the winter months, many report (complain) about how cold it is. They don't do anything about it nor can they. So, in this respect, what good is it to be a thermometer? It doesn't help the person complaining and it doesn't help those who hear the complaints. Similarly, the paralyzed man was focused on his problem, but insightfully, Jesus doesn't talk about his problem. Instead, Jesus just gives the man direction to do something that he has probably never done.

Jesus was a thermostat and was inviting the man to be one as well. A thermostat changes the environment. The paralyzed man became a thermostat when he trusted and obeyed Jesus' Word. People even noticed the change. What if the man hadn't trusted Jesus and obeyed His Word? He would have remained a thermometer.

How does this play out in the church? A thermometer complains about what isn't happening or what's wrong with what's happening. That's all you get. It is the opposite of helpful. How did Jesus deal with the paralyzed man's complaint? He said, "Get up..." What would Jesus most likely say to someone who complains in church? "Get up..." Now that thermometer has an opportunity to become a thermostat simply by trusting and obeying God's Word where they are actually involved in changing the environment. People notice such changes.

Do you see a need in the church? Perhaps it's a ministry that is lacking or a need being missed. Perhaps someone or some group needs help or encouragement? Maybe someone is struggling? Jesus is saying,

"Get up..." The fact that you see it is Jesus offering you an opportunity to trust and obey Him. "Pick up your mat and walk." Become a thermostat that changes the environment. The ability to do so comes from God as you trust and obey.

The overall theme of this text was to reveal that Jesus was truly God in the flesh. Jesus said in verse nineteen, "For whatever the Father does, the Son likewise does."



However, when Jesus revealed His identity with signs, it always affected people. How will you be affected? Will you be a thermometer that just reports/complains about the environment or will you be a thermostat that actually does something to help change the environment? Jesus says, "Get up..." Now what happens?

President David Sutherland called the meeting to order. Devotions were led by Marcine Olsen with reading John 15:9-17, God commands us to love one another. We are called to be friends and love each other. Marcine O. opened in prayer. Dave Sutherland will lead devotions in August.

Elders' Consultation: Wayne Smith reported with a follow up of the Know Your Church survey. 41 surveys were completed. Three areas were identified as strengths for CTK: prayer, worship and fellowship. Three areas were also identified as weaknesses for CTK: ministry, evangelism, and discipleship. 



Missionary to Uganda: Michael Rokenbrodt

Michael Rokenbrodt is a seasonal missionary, working with Ambassador Institute in Uganda for half the year and coming home to the United States for assisting youth camps. Originally a teacher, Michael loved investing in his students but felt restless. By invitation of his good friend Micah Berger, he traveled to Uganda and has felt called back ever since. He was commissioned as an AFLC missionary in 2018.



For part of the year, Michael is in Uganda serving in his role as a support to the national leaders and the full-time missionaries stationed in Jinja. Because of his unique position, his focus of the ministry can be flexible and adapt to the needs of the time. In 2018, Michael spent time with Micah, exploring locations for possible church plants and speaking in local schools.
