Last year it was petunias, this year it was pansies. My wife and I planted them in the spring with great anticipation. We cared for them as best we knew how. We enjoyed their beauty. But suddenly in midsummer they went from full bloom to full doom! Dead!

This reminds me of a familiar passage from Isaiah 40:6-8:

A voice says, "Cry!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All flesh is grass, and all its beauty is like the

flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades when the breath of the Lord blows on it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever.

As I write this article, my heart is heavy from the loss of a dear friend. She flourished on this earth. She was a delight to all she met. She loved the Lord. She was like a flower in God's garden. In many ways, it seemed like she would always be with us. But then she was gone – withered like the flower of the field.



Have you considered life and death recently? God loves life. After all, He created life! But sin and death entered the world and spread to everyone living being (Romans 5:12). This is why Isaiah compares people to grass. Like flowers, our life on this earth is very limited. None of us know the number of our days. No matter how accomplished, successful, or powerful you are, death will always find you. You and I will become part of the ultimate statistic: 19 out of 19 people die!

In contrast to flowers and flesh, Isaiah considers the Word of God. He confidently states that "the Word of our God will stand forever." This is the same Word that spoke the world into existence. The same Word that turned dead dust into living humans. The same Word that became flesh, lived a perfect life, suffered death, and defeated death once for all – Jesus Christ. Which would you rather trust? Your fading flesh or the Living and Eternal Word of God?

For months we have been eating, drinking, and breathing statistics about COVID-19. It is not wrong to be informed, but **it is wrong to fear a virus**. The virus is not in control – God is! The virus does not decide our final breath – God does. The virus is not God. Quarantine may protect you from the virus (for a time), but nothing can separate you from the Almighty God. One day, your body will fail and you will stand before the judgement seat of God. No quarantine, mask, or sanitizer will protect you. You will stand "naked and exposed to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account." (Hebrews 4:13, ESV) On that day your only hope will be found in the crucified and risen Word of God. Yes, "the grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever." Praise the Lord!

Minutes of CTK Congregational Vote completed June 13, 2020

At the Trustee meeting of May 28, 2020, the Trustees reviewed several shingling/roofing quotes/advice, selected a company and then discussed the shingle project and the need to comply with the constitution of CTK for congregational approval to borrow funds for any reason. Due to the pandemic it would be difficult to hold a congregational meeting at this time and to include people who are at risk or have concerns to take part in a meeting. To prevent further damage to the building the shingle project needs to be completed soon.

Morgan M. moved, seconded by Brandie H. to send an email to voting members of CTK with instruction to reply within 10 days their vote for or against borrowing funds for the shingle project. A letter will be sent to those without an email address on file. Motion carried. The Trustees acknowledge this is not ideal but with the current events it will give the congregation the ability to vote and express any questions or concerns.





President Jim Gawerecki called the meeting to order. Social distancing was observed. Devotions were led by Dave Sutherland by reading a passage from National Prayer Room based on Isaiah 12:2. As God is our salvation we don't need to fear. The word "behold" is the wonder of a new experience. Behold in modern language would be "Look! Can you believe this?" Old Business:

New Business:

Use of folding chairs: Cristin Winter requested to use some August 1 for Jackson's graduation reception. Lynn Glidewell requested to use 40 for her wedding reception to be picked up on August 6. Heather D. moved to approve, seconded by Dave S. Motion carried.

CCLI due for renewal \$510.00: This included the copyright & streaming license and SongSelect Advance. Dave S. so moved, seconded by Jim O. Motion carried.

Donation to Our Daily Bread: Last year we donated \$200. Morgan M. moved to give \$200 out of the Thrivent fund, seconded by Dave S. Motion carried.

Novel Energy Solutions: A request was received to CTK to participate in a solar garden project. The trustees agreed to email a thank you to the company indicating we are not interested in participation in the project at this time.

Use bus for VBS: Pastor Matthew would like to use the bus for VBS, Ross L. has offered to drive. The batteries may need to be replaced.

Denis Parsley request to rent bus: Denis needs to check if his insurance will cover the bus while he is using it, if it does, then he can rent the bus. So moved by Dave S., seconded by Heather D. Motion carried.

Automatic hand sanitizing station: Collene L. submitted information for ordering a hand sanitizing station. The station, which includes an automatic dispenser and stand, for smaller churches will be \$139 plus shipping. Laurie B. suggested to check reviews before ordering. Laurie B. moved to order the smaller dispenser and stand, seconded by Jim O. motion carried.

Other: Ginger McNickle suggested the ash trees on the west side of the property be removed and replant some other varieties of trees. She recommended removing about ¼ and replacing them to start with and it would be best to do it in the winter. Tabled Bill V. will check if the city will remove the trees.

Heather D. moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Jim O. Pastor Tim closed in prayer. Jim G. adjourned the meeting. The trustees will continue to meet in the fellowship hall until restrictions change.







Missionaries to Uganda, Africa

Thank you so much for reaching out to us and for praying for the family. We appreciate it and it is so encouraging. We are looking forward to seeing you all in a couple of weeks. In Christ, Brent

Brent and Emily began their work in Uganda in September of 2017. They have spent their first years studying the culture, building relationships and reaching out to people in their community. The Raans were called to Uganda with the vision of planting free and living Lutheran congregations. Brent and Emily are praying over a strategic location to make that a reality.

Brent also continues to work with the Ambassador Institute program in Uganda. The Ambassador Institute program is overseen by a leadership team made up of nationals and classes continue to expand out from the Jinja area. Brent is also working as a trainer with the Ambassador Institute program in India.

The following is an excerpt from their latest newsletter.

The home that so graciously hosted our family for the past two months in North Dakota has a picture that says, "Until God opens the next door, praise Him in the hallway." We are in a "hallway" time right now, wondering how long we will be in the US and what God has for our family through this time. Many people have asked when we're going back. Well, we still have tickets to return in October, but since Uganda's borders are still closed with no talk about when they might re-open, we are holding those plans loosely in the hands of our Provider, who knows better than we do. Would you please pray with us for God's leading for our family and for peace in the midst of all this uncertainty?



Prayer Concerns

Pray for Uganda, they have roughly 1,050 cases within the country and praise God that no one has passed away. Pray as the country is still in lockdown and it is causing some difficult times for the Ugandan nationals.

Pray that the borders will open up so that we can return to the country at the end of October.

Pray for our ministry partners, the Jores, as they continue to minister in the midst of this season.

Pray for the Acholi people. This is the people group that we will be moving up to when we return.

Pray for our family as we are moving around a lot during this furlough & especially our kids.

While in this hallway, we are praising Him! Praise Him today, friends - no matter your situation. In the good and the hard times. Rejoice that He is still God and He is on His throne and He is still good!
