As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. When shall I come and appear before God? My tears have been my food day and night, while they say to me all the day long, "Where is your God?" These things I remember, as I pour out my soul: how I would go with the throng and lead them in procession to the house of God with glad shouts and songs of praise, a multitude keeping festival. (Psalm 42:1-4)



There has been a drought. Church has not stopped, but we have gone two and a half months (10 Sundays + 4 Lenten Services) without meeting for inperson worship. During this time, there have been two big questions swirling in my mind: (1) What is corporate worship? (2) Why do we long for it?

What is corporate worship?

At the time of this article, our church leaders are working to determine the steps that we should take to come back together for our Sunday morning worship service. Until our community was rocked by COVID-19 induced changes, we probably would have defined *corporate worship* based on the pattern of our Sunday morning worship service at 10:30am in the sanctuary. But what is *corporate worship*?

First, let's look at the idea of worship. The term *worship* is used frequently in the Old Testament. The Hebrew and Greek words literally refer to the act of bowing down. The Latin word (from which we get our English) literally means to show worth. In the case of a Christian, worship is ascribing worth to our God, our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. When Jesus spoke of worship to the woman at the well, He clearly defined worship not as a location (the temple in Jerusalem), but an attitude of the heart. He said, "God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." Luther understood this when he said: "The worship of God . . . should be free at table, in private rooms, downstairs, upstairs, at home, abroad, in all places, by all people, at all times." (What Luther Says, vol. III, ed. by Ewald M. Plass, [St. Louis: Concordia Publishing House, 1959], p. 1546)

Second, if worship is an attitude of the heart, why do we come together on Sundays? The word *corporate* literally refers to a body (think corpse). The church is the living body of Christ. This body of Christ is comprised of corpses that Jesus has brought back to life. A large part of the body's function is to join together for mutual praise to the Savior and encouragement. Our pattern for how this takes place is found in Acts 2:42 where the first church "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellow-ship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers."

Corporate worship is central to the function of the body, the Church. The Holy Spirit inspired the author of Hebrews to write: "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to <u>meet together</u>, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near." (Hebrews 10:25, ESV) Continued

Why do we long for it?

Many of us grew up going to church "just because." I distinctly remember my parents loading me up with my five siblings into our van and driving us 45 minutes to church. It was a family tradition. It was an expectation. In a way, it was an obligation. As I grew older, something began to change. Obligation turned to anticipation. Why?

Go back and read Psalm 42:1-4 at the beginning of this article. The soul of a believer longs (yes even thirsts) to be in the presence of the Lord. When we gather with other believers to hear the Word of God and sing praises to His name, our spiritual souls are filled. Just like our body longs for food each day, our soul thirsts for the spiritual nourishment of joining together with others under Biblical teaching and fellowship.

There is no replacement for corporate worship. We need the Lord's presence in our lives. We need each other. As long as we are spiritually alive, our soul will "thirst for God, for the living God."

Trustee Minutes Christ The King Free Lutheran Church May 14, 2020 7:00 pm

Present: Dave Sutherland, Jim Otter, Brandie Hulstein, Laurie Bruns, Jim Gawerecki, Matthew Amdahl, Heather DeWilde, Morgan McNickle Absent: Bill VanderPlaats **Also Present**: Mike Morgan, Collene Landgren, Pastor Tim, Pastor Matthew. **President Jim Gawerecki** called the meeting to order. Social distancing was observed by only one person per table. Devotions were led by Matthew A. from a devotional by Charles Stanley based on Proverbs 3:5. We will try to analyze and control our situations and circumstances; it doesn't work. Proverbs 3:5 says we need to trust the Lord. Our view is limited, we need to humble ourselves under God and seek Him and then we will see His glorious work in our life. Matthew A. led in prayer. Bill V. will lead devotions in June.

Elders' Consultation: The Elders have been keeping contact with each other and those on the shut-in list or those in need by phone and are planning on meeting next week.

The Treasurer's report for April was presented. Dave S. moved, to accept treasure's report. Seconded by Brandie H. Motion carried.

Treasurer Mike Morgan explained the Cares Payroll Protection Plan. CTK applied for the PPP in the amount of \$ 25,000 and the loan was approved and disbursed April 21 to a special account set up by the First Bank. 75% of the total loan amount is to be paid to payroll and will be forgiven at the end of the loan period. April payroll would be included in this program. Dave S. moved, seconded by Laurie B. to approve transfer funds from the PPP account to the general account to cover payroll. June payroll will be issued before June 21 to be included in the Cares PPP 8-week time frame.

The Payment of bills, Heather D. moved to approve the bills, seconded by Matthew A. Motion carried.

Outreach was discussed; Jim O. moved to approve outreach, seconded by Laurie B. Motion carried.

Youth Ministry and Family Ministry Reports:

Youth Ministry: Pastor Matthew reported for the Youth ministry: They have been holding regular Zoom meetings on Wednesday nights. It works for a temporary basis but isn't the same as meeting in person. Some outside activities are being planned.

Family Ministry: Has not meet since March.

Pastors' Report: Pastor Tim submitted a report of activities for the period March 13-May 14. Most of the time and connection has been through phone calls. Pastor Tim commended Pastor Matthew for the work he has been doing with setting up and making the live streaming of the worship service. He has been doing the majority of the technical work. The upcoming schedule will be May 24 & 31 will be a drive-in service. June 7 tentatively, will be the confirmation service. Pastor Tim asked for thoughts and ideas for beginning public in-person worship since that was part of the elders' agenda. Some ideas were opening the Fellowship Hall with live-stream in order to promote social distancing, have outdoor services over the summer, wrap the drinking fountain so it can't be used when we are gathering and not serving coffee and food.

Pastor Matthew submitted a report of activities for March -April, most of his time has been involved meeting and checking with people by phone. Pastor Matthew reported he will be trying out a used cable management system called a stagebox snake. This will help simplify set up and tear down for the drive in and outdoor services. Morgan M. moved seconded by Matt A. to purchase the used system for \$169.00. Motion carried.

Pastor Matthew requested a revision of his vacation time that was approved at the April meeting. He will be taking vacation time the following dates, June 17-20 and June 28-July 1.

Old Business:

Replace Door: The bottom sweep still needs to be adjusted Roof: Jim G. reported there have been 4 bids submitted for the shingle project. After discussion a motion was made by Dave S. seconded by Jim O. to accept the bid from Wurscher Construction, Brookings SD for the amount of \$47,600. They will be using GAF Timberline shingles. Morgan M. abstained from voting. Motion carried. Morgan M. will contact Wurscher Construction and provide samples of shingles for Laurie B., Brandie H., and Heather D. to choose a color to order. Jim G. and Matthew A. will contact the bank about securing a loan for the shingle project and sign any necessary paperwork. An email will be sent to the members of the congregation informing them of the need to shingle the roof. Flower Planters: Brandie H. will purchase flowers and plant them. Serving at the Banquet: CTK will be providing funds, preparing, and serving the meal on June 16. The Banquet is requesting 6 people to prepare and 6 to 8 to serve the meal. A sign up sheet will be posted in the fover.

New Business:

VBS: A letter was received from the Bible Collage informing us Summer teams will not be sent out to lead VBS this year due to the covid-19 virus situation. At this time CTK will cancel VBS and try to plan a game day event.

PC for live stream & presentation software: Pastor Matthew provided information to purchase a computer to facilitate live streaming of the worship service. It could also be used for the presentation software when we are worshiping in the sanctuary again. Matt A. moved to purchase the computer and software not to exceed \$900, seconded by Brandie H. motion carried. Funds will be used from the Thrivent account.

Stay At Home Order: The Stay at Home order has been replaced by the Stay Safe Minnesota order that continues to limit gatherings to 10 or less. More details are to be issued May 20. Plans will be discussed for resuming regular worship services. The church building will resume being open regular office hours.

Post cards are being sent to those members and regular attendees if we do not have an email address in our records. This is to announce schedule changes and upcoming events.

Denis Parsley offered to store the church bus in his machine shed at his farm. Thank you, Denis. Arrangements will be made for someone to take the bus out to the Parsley farm.

Heather D. moved to adjourn the meeting. Pastor Tim closed in prayer. Jim G. adjourned the meeting.

Minutes of CTK Joint Trustee & Elder Meeting May 28, 2020

President Jim Gawerecki called the meeting to order and requested Wayne Smith to open with prayer. **There was discussion** on how to go forward with resuming worship services in the sanctuary. The Elders put together a statement at their May 21, 2020 meeting that was discussed and revised. This will be made available through email to the congregation and handed out at the worship service. Laurie B. will write up a COVID-19 Preparedness Plan for Christ the King for continuing worship and for employees. Some of the recommendations for resuming worship were to have hand sanitizer available around the foyer, clean handles of doors, prop the doors open for services, the nursery will not be available during services, and remind people if they are high risk or not comfortable to utilize other options for worship. The other options include live stream at home, listen to the service using the car radio, or view the service on a personal device at ctkpipestone.com. It is important to for people to realize there is the possibility of risk and if they are concerned it may be better for them to remain at home and worship using the live stream options. Worshiping in person is a voluntary action and left to the discretion of individuals.

Laurie B. made a motion to resume in-person worship services with the modifications to the recommendations of the elders and to have a covid plan in place. Seconded by Jim O. Motion carried. The Elders left the meeting.

The Trustees continued to discuss the shingle project and the need to comply with the constitution of CTK for congregational approval to borrow funds for any reason. Due to the pandemic it would be difficult to hold a congregational meeting at this time and to include people who are at risk or have concerns to take part in a meeting. To prevent further damage to the building the shingle project needs to be completed soon.

Morgan M. moved, seconded by Brandie H. to send an email to voting members of CTK with instruction to reply within 10 days their vote for or against borrowing funds for the shingle project. A letter will be sent to those without an email address on file. Motion carried. The Trustees acknowledge this is not ideal but with the current events it will give the congregation the ability to vote and express any questions or concerns.

Heather D. moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Laurie B.






THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU!!
